


Concept


Through its work with partner universities, BABSEA CLE identified a need to develop practical curriculum on legal ethics, pro bono, access to justice, and professional responsibility. BABSEA CLE found that most universities in Southeast Asia either do not teach legal ethics or teach legal ethics in theory or as part of another subject. In countries where these topics are taught they are usually taught by lecture, making it difficult for students to engage with the issues in a practical manner. The teaching usually does not emphasize on the role that lawyer can play in promoting access to justice and engaging in pro bono work. BABSEA CLE also found that there was a lack of textbooks and curriculum on legal ethics,


This project responds to that need, by developing practical curriculum on these topics. Legal ethics, access to justice and pro bono (largely) cross jurisdictions, meaning that one curriculum can be developed and used as a template by partners in numerous countries. This template can then be tailored to each jurisdiction, and taught by lawyers, clinicians, lecturers and other legal professionals.


Overview of Legal Ethics Curriculum in Southeast Asia



Collaboration

In July 2013, Herbert Smith Freehills, DLA Piper / New Perimeter, the Australian Government Solicitor, BABSEA CLE, BABSEA CLE Australia, BABSEACLE Singapore and CLE Foundation commenced a collaboration to develop a training curriculum on Legal Ethics, Pro Bono, Access to Justice and Professional Responsibility.

The course materials, which are being designed using a clinical legal education methodology, are intended to be incorporated into existing university courses across South East Asia.

The project aims to foster the professional ethics of upcoming generations of lawyers and promote a legal culture that values the important role that lawyers play in providing pro bono services to enhance access to justice for the poor, the marginalized, the disadvantaged and the unpopular. By strengthening the culture of ethics and professional responsibility we hope to enhance the professional reputation and pride of young lawyers; and by expanding equal access to justice we hope to contribute to the further development of equal societies which respect and uphold the rule of law.



Connecting to the local team

Our BABSEA CLE local team and volunteers from your chosen country will contact the pro bono lawyers to provide guidance on accommodation, training and workshop logistics including budget.

Training Materials

Once the dates are confirmed, BABSEA CLE develops an agenda of the sessions to be covered in workshop. Pro bono lawyers are then given materials to review for the training including the chapters, related code of conducts and training tips.

Itinerary

Pro bono lawyers book flights, visas (if needed) and accommodation and inform the project coordinator about arrival & departure times, accommodation place and any other special requirements.





Workshop Planning

Before the training, BABSEA CLE local team connects via Skype or conference call to the Pro Bono lawyers and discuss the training sessions in detail as well as discussing logistics in-country.

Conduct a Workshop

A workshop can be 1-3 days and usually is held at the university. BABSEA CLE local team members facilitate and provide support throughout the workshop to ensure a successful and smooth training for all.
